EU, EAA, and Swiss citizens


European citizens can start working in Estonia without any special permit, just like locals.

The employer does have to register your employment at the Tax and Customs Board employment registry. For that, you need to have an Estonian personal identification code (isikukood).


Checklist: step-by-step guide to work in Estonia for EU, EAA, and Swiss citizens:

Finding suitable **housing Renting** is the easiest way to find a home when you first arrive in Estonia. The rental market is quite lively in Tallinn, and good properties don't stay on the market for long.

Broadly speaking, if in San Francisco or Amsterdam you might spend around half of your monthly salary on rent, in Tallinn it'll probably be much less, at around 35%. The go-to sources for rentals are city24.ee and kv.ee, but the selection largely overlaps.

When you find a property you're interested in, contact the broker listed on the site. You will usually be charged a broker's fee equivalent to a month's rent.

Utility bills (normally including water, electricity, recycling, etc.) can run up to €150 or more during the winter months and significantly less in the summer, depending on the type of building.
